

About Rainbow Community Angels

RCA is a community safety initiative aiming to train and support the community, provide safety and risk management and be a vibrant, visible presence at events, celebrating pride and queer joy!

We believe that as a community, we are capable of organising to protect ourselves. We are working to create the alternative strategies that our communities need, providing **support** and **protection**.

RCA is a network of ~150 volunteers across Victoria, metro and regional. We provide training so that all participants can have a shared understanding and approach to our work – we are strictly **non-violent** and **non-confrontational** – we do not engage with far right protestors beyond cheering to drown them out. Our training is community building through discussions, sharing experiences, and bringing together diverse people with a shared goal of ensuring the safety of our young people and cultural events. We show up in direct action because it works and because community is powerful.

Behind the scenes: we provide risk management and supportive community for events who are targeted or are at risk of being targeted by groups who wish to erase queer people from community life. What you see is big angels wings, proud, visible solidarity and unabashed queer joy. This is powerful in of itself – to **show up despite threats, fear and intimidation** with a smile, a daggy playlist, glitter and some joyfully dorky dance moves, to **demonstrate the existence of queer families, trans joy, that there is a future** and intergenerational support.

We work with organisers to ensure events go ahead, making it clear that hate isn't welcome here.

We provide practical and community support to ensure staff feel supported, safe, and culturally informed when running rainbow events.

The most powerful role of the RCA is one of hope, of refusing to disappear, and of magnifying the LGBTQIA+ people and events that happen in communities across Victoria. The more visible we are, despite threats, hateful rhetoric, moral panics, wedge politics and misinformation, the better. When we stand in solidarity as a community, we send a crucial message: we're here, we're safe, we're not going anywhere, and we will protect each other.

No matter where people are on their journey, whether they're out, or still closeted, or figuring it out – we're here for you. We are actively inclusive of allies.

Our Purpose and Values

Purpose

Our mission is to help other organisations to create and maintain spaces for their local LGBTQIA+ communities. Bringing rainbow presence and support to communities that are under threat, outside of metro areas, or that don't have traditional resources to manage intra-community conflicts that arise as they deliver diverse and inclusive events. We defend rainbow families and young people from street harassment, and we amplify organisations' messages of welcoming and joy.

We believe that action is the best form of community care – our LGBTQIA+ communities need allies to stand up, be visible, and help us do the work of defending everyday people from harmful media narratives, and the cancellations of our events that are important for LGBTIQA+ community connection and pride.

Our Values



radical trust

We place trust in our community of angels that we will keep one another safe, and treat each other with compassion, and kindness. Despite any differences in our lives, in our roles as angels we are united and we come together to protect our community members.



solidarity

We are stronger together – it is empowering to stand as a collective of queer people and allies alike, for queer people and the wider community. We stand together for our rainbow young people, families, and LGBTQIA+ community in love and protection.



queer joy

We are a community of people living joyful, meaningful lives. We will not leave people behind, and we will not let negative or inaccurate narratives dominate or represent us.

What we do

consultation

Providing guidance and support to organisations planning youth events, and contributing our expertise towards policy development

training

3 hours of community sharing, discussion and practical activities with LGBTQIA+ people and allies, including hearing from established Angel volunteers

supporting events

Our volunteer Angels and our organiser travel and attend events to shield guests and staff from harassment - as well as lifting spirits

RCA provides a full service from initial research, liaison and planning, to training, attending events, and debriefing. The focus is on directly protecting our community, not on confrontation or general advocacy. RCA feels unique in how safe and effective it is - and in how it doesn't feel like a trade-off between safety and effectiveness. I like that there's such a strong emphasis on communication, safety and consent."

Case Study

We attended an outer suburban area that was hosting its first LGBTQIA youth event. The organisers had concerns, and we provided consultation to reassure them and make recommendations. We attended the event to provide visible, joyous support and enhance the safety of attendees, and we received feedback from parents that they were grateful that we were there. In the end, we got to see a community try something new, and deliver support to their local young people with a queer formal right in their neighbourhood.



As our first Pride Formal ...we were quite nervous, and your suggestions and guidance - and even knowing that we would have your support on the night - was incredibly supportive, and enabled us to deliver Rainbow Promenade, engaging 80 young people! Our Growth

When Rainbow Community
Angels was founded in 2023,
LGBTIQA+ youth events
were getting programmed,
but then cancelled due to
threats. As members of
the queer community, our
founders knew the pain of
discrimination, and wanted
to show up for the next
generation of queers.

The motif of angels has been used since the death of Matthew Shepard, when his friends dressed as angels during the trial of his killers to block his family from having to pass by members of the Westboro Baptist Church who were picketing. Since then, some of our founders were also involved in dressing as angels to protect a youth formal in 2017 which was targeted by far right activists. This motif was readopted when Rainbow Community Angels was formed in 2023.

Lettroms Kids be Kids! In the 2024–2025 financial year, we weathered the impacts of the US election, the Queensland directive against gender affirming care for trans young people, and the attempts during the Australian Federal Election to use trans people for political division. Rainbow Community Angels responded to the tensions and fears within the community by coming together, training people in our culture of non violence and community care.

We will keep on showing up for LGBTQIA+ young people and families when events are threatened, the new threat now is that events simply won't be programmed.

We wanted to offer a point of difference to de-escalate through queer joy and celebration and in recognition of the types of events we were largely protecting. We wanted families to feel safe to bring children to hear stories read to them and we didn't want kids or parents and carers to feel any negative sentiment.

Our Impact

From June 1 2024 to May 31 2025 we:

We influenced and supported over 14,000 people through the 2024-2025 Financial Year, with our volunteers contributing over 1252 volunteer hours

We connected with and consulted to organisations including NFPs and branches of local government, responding to varied needs with flexibility and adapting our presence according to diverse situations.

As part of our onboarding process for organisations and events we provide a presence at, we share our accumulative learning from past events, outlining our requirements for safety plans, providing support to groups about safely programming and promoting events and influencing organisation's policy decisions about programming safe, inclusive and joyful LGBTQIA+ events for young people.

Volunteers

Our volunteers come from all walks of life; there are parents and grandparents of LGBTQIA+ people, siblings, queer young people themselves, and folks from all suburbs and areas, including rural and regional Victoria.

Inclusion and diversity is at the core of Rainbow Community Angels, beyond connection with the LGBTQIA+ community our volunteers represent a range of lived experiences, often including being multiply-marginalised, including through:

- Disability
- · Chronic illness
- · Mental ill health

Economic disadvantage.

Every training, mobilisation, and rainbow community angels event has flexibility and accommodations embedded in our planning and structures to provide opportunities for participation to all members of our community. They contribute to this movement in many ways, through fundraising, through local advocacy for events in their local communities, helping us sew and construct our wings and now sitting on our Committee to steer Rainbow Community Angels forward.

Volunteer outcomes

At events our LGBTQIA+ and ally volunteers help in a range of ways:

- Some will wear magnificent rainbow angel wings, shielding attendees entering the event from seeing or hearing any hostile protesters who are present
- Some will act as marshals, assisting with communication and safety for Rainbow Community Angels, event staff and participants.
- Some will liaise as needed with media, event organisers, performers, security, police and the public
- Together, we show up to be proud and joyful, showing the wider community that we are here in every community, and we deserve to be celebrated.

Training and Workshops

Training is our chance to meet local people who want to stand up for the LGBTQIA community in their towns and show young people in particular that their community wants them and will protect them.

Over 3 hours we come together to reflect on what community care is in action, and engage in practical activities to rehearse what being a Rainbow Community Angel can look and feel like.

While I would never understate the risks imposed by taking on an RCA activation, especially when there is likely to be any opposition in attendance, safety for our participants is always RCA's first consideration and the training that is being conducted to equip participants is simple, effective and empowering."

Events

- Youth Formals We've travelled to regional communities to ensure that young people get to participate in queer formals and be celebrated for who they are, without having to leave their hometowns.
- Inclusive Swim events Trans people are particularly under attack right now regarding our right to participate in sports. Many councils are showing up for LGBTQIA+ people by putting on inclusive swim events, and this deserves to be celebrated and defended. We show up to make it clear that we just want to swim like everybody else.
- Rainbow Storytimes Libraries change and save lives. Our stories and messages of inclusion and acceptance are important, and we are proud to support the work of librarians making rainbow families welcomed.

I am feeling optimistic about the potential for our future and our growth. We are just getting started. "

has also made it possible to hire
some part-time staff; I don't think
this need has gone away. The
political environment around us
has also changed. RCA is still very
much needed, and likely will be for
the foreseeable future. "
